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Message from the Mayor



I want to thank everyone who came out to the First Annual Fall for Springfield Festival & Car Show. Those who spent the beautiful fall Sunday on Mountain Avenue enjoyed a larger than usual street festival with an assortment of vendors and food. Between the free inflatable rides and games to the diverse car show and music, there was plenty of entertainment for young and old. The turnout was impressive and hopefully it is just the start of an annual program that will grow and become more successful. It would not have been possible without the

efforts of the Springfield Patriot Chamber of Commerce, the many sponsors, and the organizer, Bobby Abraham.

It is important to make note of a new state mandate that requires electronic items such as televisions, computers and printers be recycled. Residents will no longer be allowed to place these items out for bulk waste collection. As an alternative, the Department of Public Works has instituted a new program that will allow residents to recycle more easily. The program will also generate revenue by selling all metal items while the additional tonnage recycled will ensure a higher amount in grant money for the coming year. The enactment of this program will result in a new resident service, additional revenue and reduced expenditures at no cost to the taxpayer. One Saturday per month, residents will be allowed to drop off electronics, appliances and yard waste (leaves, grass, branches) at the parking lot of the municipal pool. Hours of operation will be 7:00 a.m. through 11:00 a.m. only. D.P.W. personnel will assist residents and place the items in dumpsters. The next scheduled drop-off date is Saturday, November 6th from 7 a.m. to 11 a.m.

For those who aren't sold on the idea, there is a great incentive to recycle. Every item recycled is one less item in our garbage stream that we have to pay for. The fees associated with garbage, between hauling and incineration, are much greater than recycling. We can reduce our budget by paying less for garbage and we earn credit for recycling.

I ask residents to take time out of their day on Thursday, November 11th at 11 a.m. to join the Springfield Veterans Alliance for a Veterans Day Tribute at Veterans Memorial Park. It is important to come together to honor and remember the sacrifices of those veterans who served our country. With the day-to-day commotion of our busy lives, it is too easy to forget the selfless contributions made by a few and we should endeavor to pass along the legacy to new generations.

Last month, I issued two proclamations to recognize two very important causes: the first declared October as Breast Cancer Awareness Month and the second declared November as Pancreatic Cancer Awareness Month. I encourage residents to make an effort to learn more about both as they affect people in our own community.

The upcoming winter season also marks the second annual Springfield Luminary fundraiser. This initiative is an excellent tradition that we can take pride in and it can serve as beneficial source for assistance to various community causes. The recipients this year are the Springfield First Aid Squad, the Springfield Y.M.C.A. Before & After Child Care Program and the Jonathan Dayton Baseball & Softball Programs. Together, let's light up Springfield this New Year's Eve.



TOO GOOD TO BE TRUE

In the past persons who were the victims of bunco scams or confidence schemes were looked upon as being complicit in the fraud acts committed against them under the old adage of "you can't cheat an honest man". Today that saying is no longer true as fraud scams are now designed to target unsuspecting persons through sophisticated cons with the use of modern technology. Fraudsters nowadays know that it is very possible, and at times extremely easy, to "cheat an honest man" so in order to enable town residents to recognize a fraud scam attempt the police division offers the following preventative tips.

Most fraud scams that specifically target residents are done via the internet or via the telephone are are designed to obtain either money or the personal identity information of the intended victim. This will be an attempt to have monies wired to the fraudsters or obtain credit account numbers or identity information such as a Social Security number.

Mail or an internet e-mail or even a telephone call that indicates a resident is a winner of any type of sweepstakes or foreign lottery where some type of monetary fee is required to be paid, is an outright scam. If you did not enter any sweepstakes or participate in any foreign lottery, there is no way you can be a winner. Whenever fees are required to be paid in advance in order to collect the supposed prize, this is a scam to con you out of your money.

If you are selling an item over the internet or you advertise some type of service that you perform, be wary of persons who contact you wanting to purchase items you've listed for sale or wanting to pay you for the services you offer where the subject pays by check which is payable to more monies than were agreed to. This scam specifically wants the intended victim to believe that the check was made out in the inflated amount by accident and will attempt to have the victim wire any monetary difference before the actual check is discovered to be counterfeit. The suspects will always be out of state or in a foreign country but will claim to be in the process of moving into Springfield. The scam targets persons selling any item from a car to a couch or offering services from babysitting to piano lessons.

Do not give out personal information to callers who claim to be representatives of your bank or any business you may have a credit account with. The fraudster may also pose as a law enforcement official with the call pretending to be some type of investigation into fraud on your account. This is done to con you into giving out a Social Security number or other personal information when the caller asks you to prove your identity. Remember that anyone who calls you should already know who you are and you do not have to give out confidential information in order to prove your identity. This same scam, known as "phishing" can also involve bogus e-mails purporting to be from a financial institution or governmental agency and is intended to con you into divulging your identity information.

In short, to prevent falling for the myriad of fraud schemes one old adage is as true today as it was years ago, and that is..."if something seems too good to be true, it probably is".

A cartoon movie about exit drills in the home, was shown in the training room while guests were treated to refreshments provided by Hecht Family Chiropractic. Children got to practice "Stop, Drop and Roll" and see the fire pole that the fire fighters slide down.

A table-top "Hazard House" was used to demonstrate the effects of common fire volunteer fire fighters and took applications.










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COAT DRIVE
